$$4x^2 - y^2 + 2xy + 5 = 0$$

The points P and Q lie on the curve.

Given that $\frac{dy}{dx} = 2$ at P and at Q,

(a) use implicit differentiation to show that y - 6x = 0 at P and at Q.

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

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

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

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

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12. (i) Relative to a fixed origin O, the line l_1 is given by the equation

$$l_1$$
: $\mathbf{r} = \begin{pmatrix} -5\\1\\6 \end{pmatrix} + \lambda \begin{pmatrix} 2\\-3\\1 \end{pmatrix}$ where λ is a scalar parameter.

The point P lies on l_1 . Given that \overrightarrow{OP} is perpendicular to l_1 , calculate the coordinates of P.

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
