



Down group ?, atomic radius increases. However they all form 24 ions. This means the charge desity decreases down the group. (b) In an experiment, a sample of hydrated magnesium nitrate, Mg(NO₃)₂.xH₂O, with a mass of 0.765 g, was dissolved in water and reacted with an excess of sodium hydroxide solution, NaOH(aq).

The precipitate of magnesium hydroxide, Mg(OH)₂, produced was removed and dried. The mass of the dried sample was 0.174 g.
