


1. (a) The graph below shows the energy distribution of particles at a temperature of 298 K.

2. Both iodine and diamond contain covalent bonding. Explain why their melting temperatures are very different. [2]

3.	Potassium manganate(VII) can be used to oxidise Fe <sup>2+</sup> ions to Fe <sup>3+</sup> ions in a redox titration.
	The following reaction occurs.

$$MnO_4^- + 5Fe^{2+} + 8H^+ \longrightarrow Mn^{2+} + 5Fe^{3+} + 4H_2O$$

In an experiment  $25.00\,\mathrm{cm^3}$  portions of  $\mathrm{Fe^{2+}(aq)}$  were titrated against a standard acidified potassium manganate(VII) solution of concentration  $0.0200\,\mathrm{mol\,dm^{-3}}$ .

The results were as follows.

4.	The green mineral atacamite contains three different ions, $M_a(OH)_b X_c$ . It is insoluble in water but can form a solution when added to acid.						
	A stu	dent planned to analyse a sample of atacamite using the following method.					
	STEP 1: Add 1.00 g of atacamite to 150 cm <sup>3</sup> of strong acid of concentration 0.100 mol dm <sup>-3</sup> , and then make this up to exactly 250 cm <sup>3</sup> with more of the same acid.						
	STEF If any	2: Take exactly 25.0 cm <sup>3</sup> of the solution from step 1 and add excess silver nitrate solution. precipitate forms, filter it off and dry completely. Record its colour and the mass formed.					
	STEF soluti forme	2 3: Take exactly 25.0 cm <sup>3</sup> of the solution from step 1 and add excess barium chloride on. If any precipitate forms, filter it off and dry completely. Record its colour and the mass ed.					
	STEP 4: Take exactly 25.0 cm <sup>3</sup> of the solution from step 1 and add excess sodium hydroxide solution. If any precipitate forms, filter it off and dry completely. Record its colour and the mass formed.						
	STEP 5: To find the amount of acid remaining in the solution, use a pH probe to find the precise pH of the solution prepared in step 1.


