1 Chemists and biochemists use  $pK_a$  values to compare the strengths of different acids.  $pK_a$  is a more convenient way of comparing acid strengths than  $K_a$  values.

 $pK_a$  values of several naturally occurring Brønsted–Lowry acids are shown in **Table 4.1** below.
