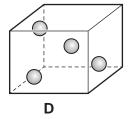

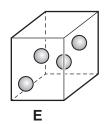

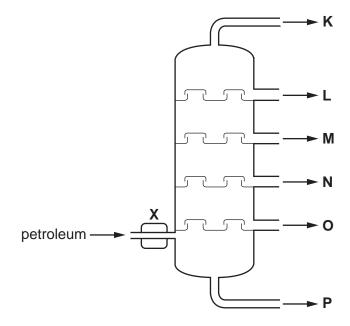

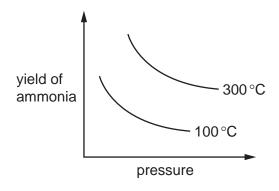

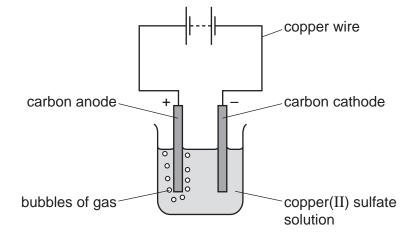

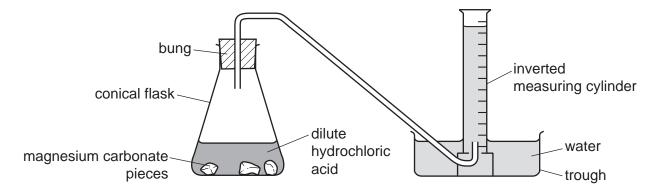

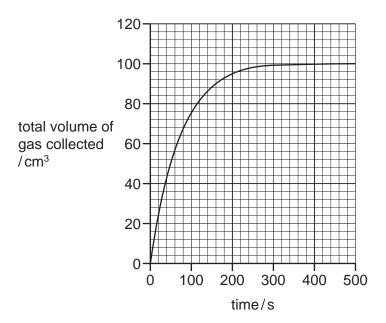
8 Magnesium carbonate reacts with dilute hydrochloric acid.
