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**SECTION A: Shakespeare****Answer one question from this section.****Begin your answer on page 4.*****Measure for Measure*****EITHER**

- 1 'The character of the Duke presents a problem for this play's audience.'

In the light of this comment, explore the extent to which Shakespeare attracts sympathy for the Duke in *Measure for Measure*.

In your answer, you must consider relevant contextual factors.

- 2 'Although the play has traces of realism, it is basically ridiculous.'
