George Sanford, the narrator, has a remarkable ability to enter the minds of other people and pick up their thoughts and feelings (he says he can feel their 'vibes' or 'emotions'). He has been hired by the Rescue Squad, a part of the New York police force, and is being given a tour of the Police Psychiatric Department.

She is a widow with one son, Ralph, who has just graduated from university and has married unexpectedly, only telling his mother after the wedding. His wife, Lottie, is pregnant and the couple have come to live with Mrs Bascomb.
