



Fig. 1 for Question 1

Food demand for MEDCs, LEDCs and the world in 1974 and 1997 and forecasts for 2020







# Energy gain and carbon dioxide (CO<sub>2</sub>) emissions for conventional fuels for motor vehicles and four biofuels
