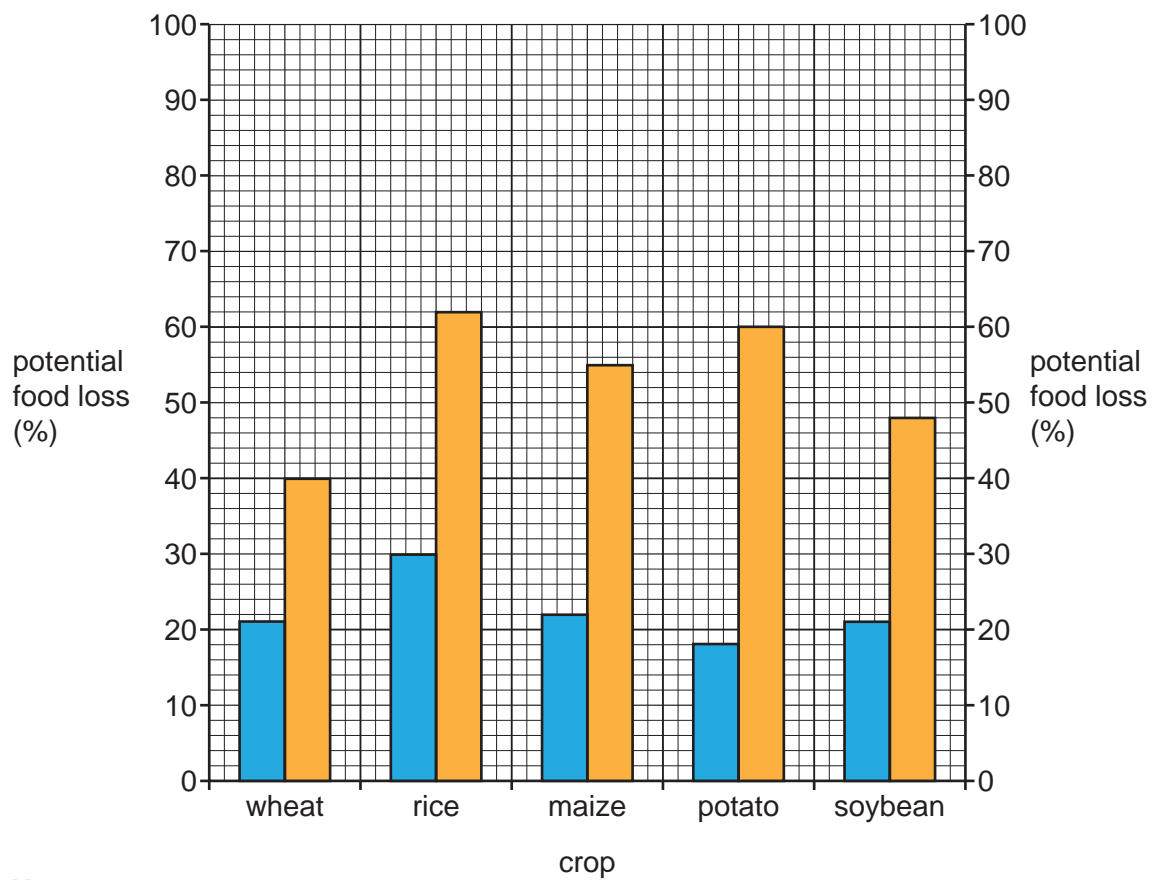

**Key**



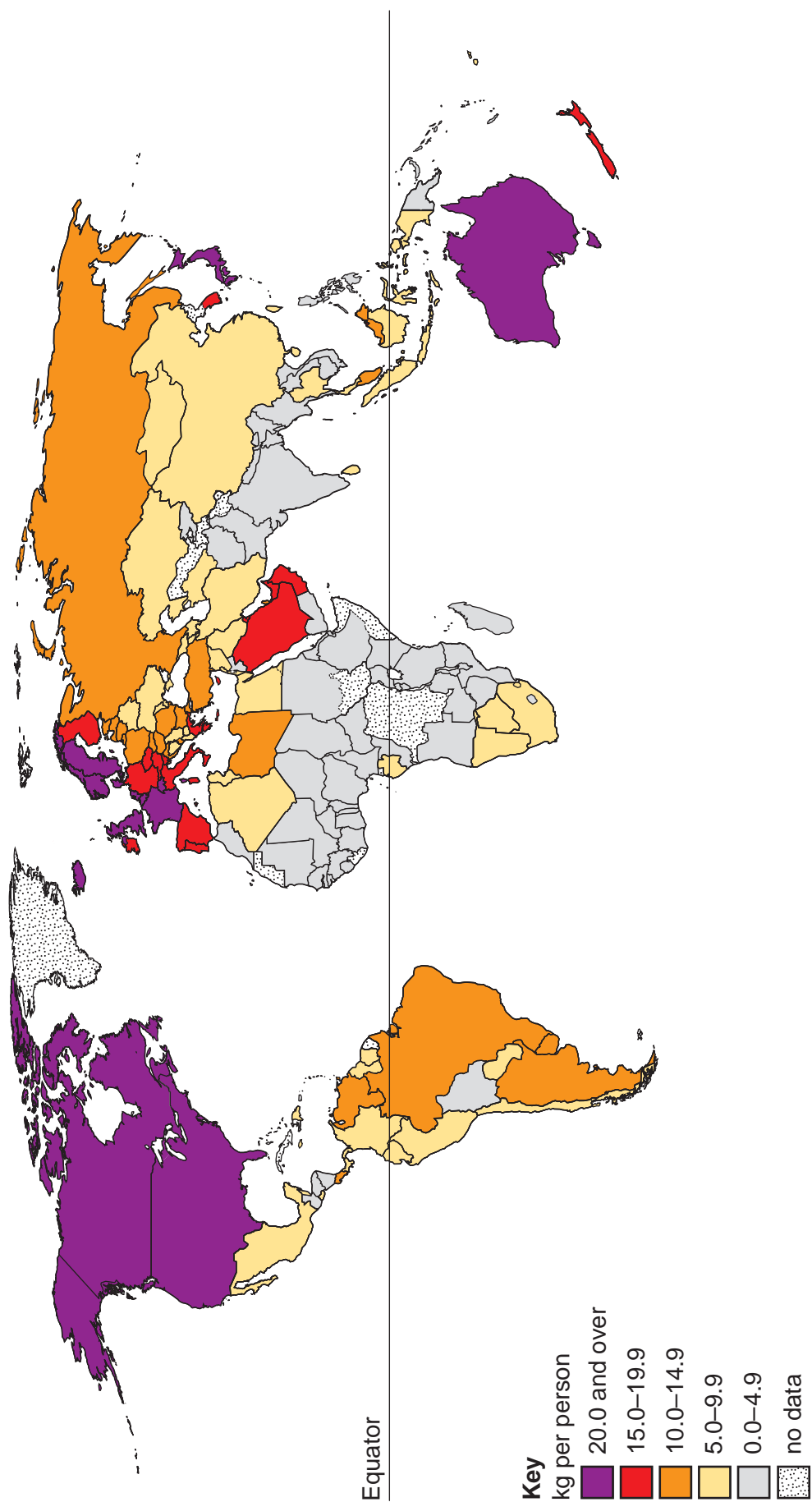
-  potential food loss with the use of pesticides and herbicides

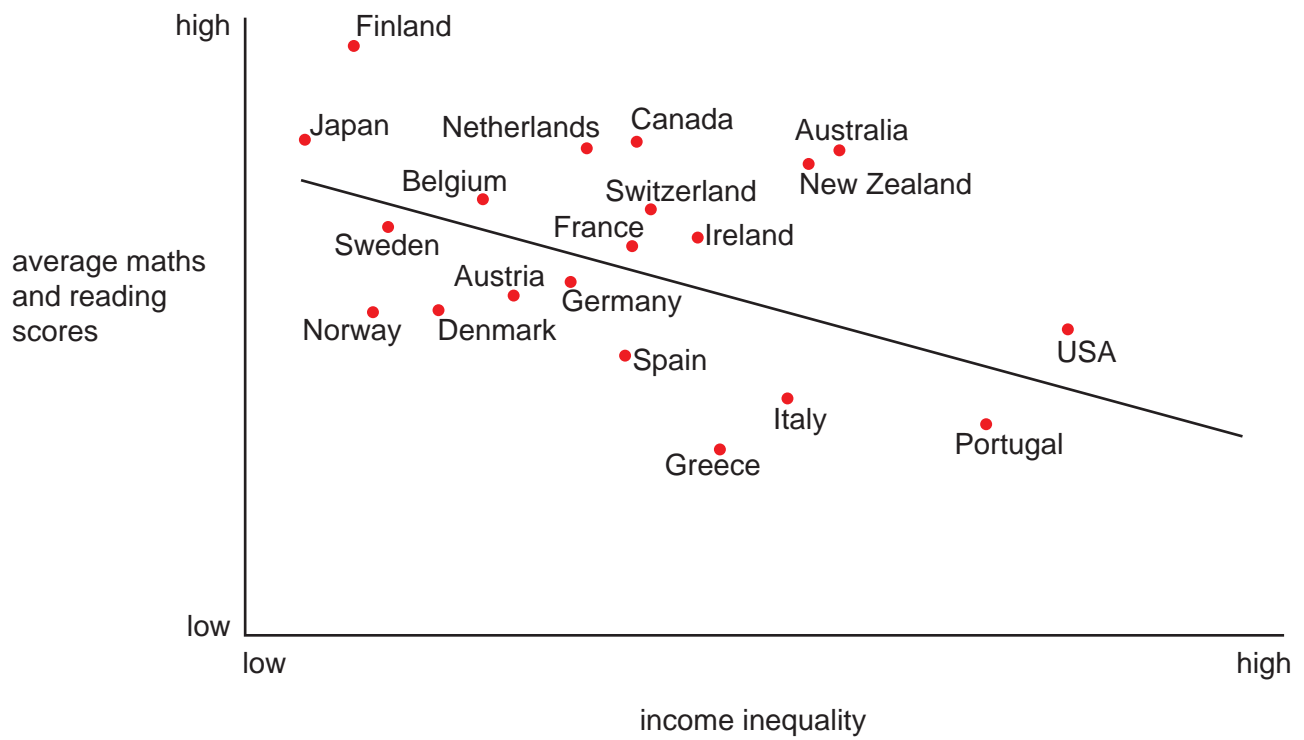
