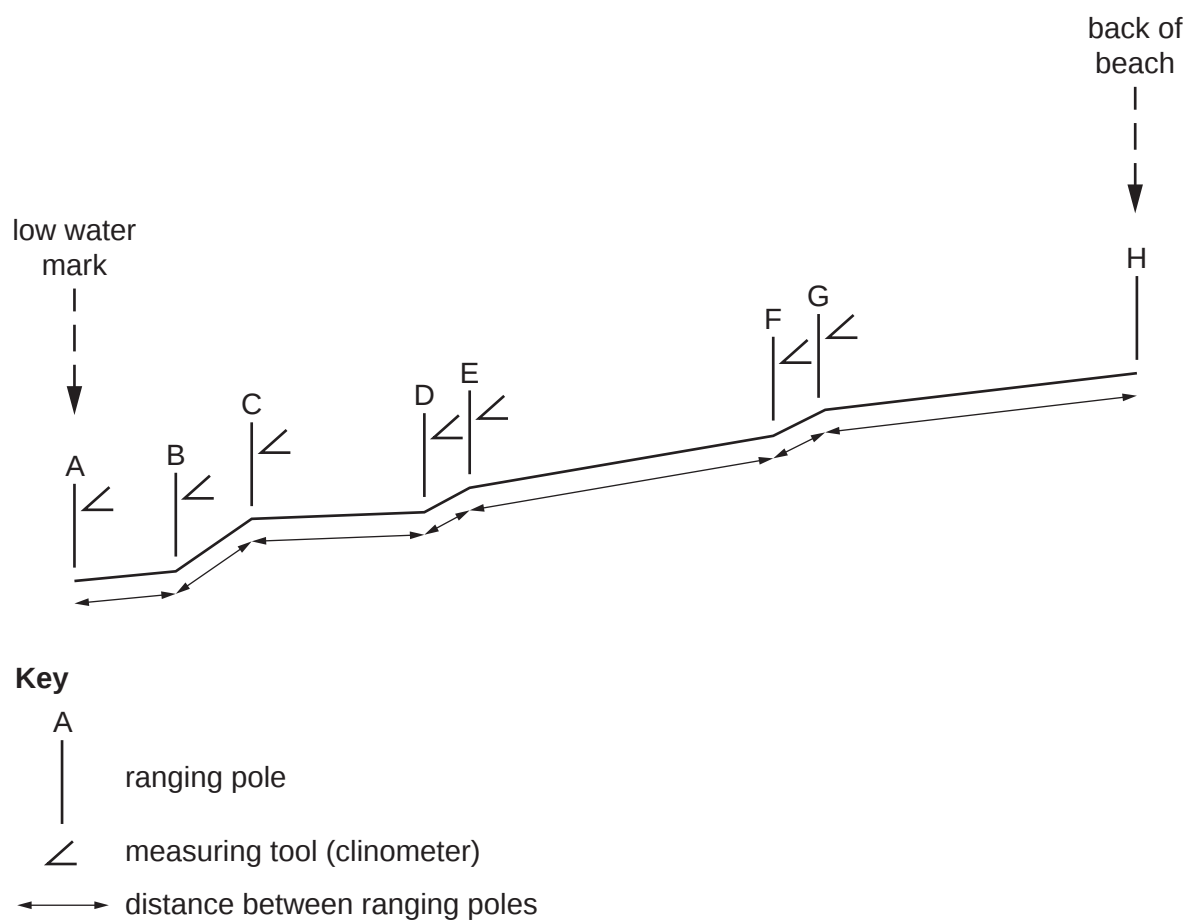

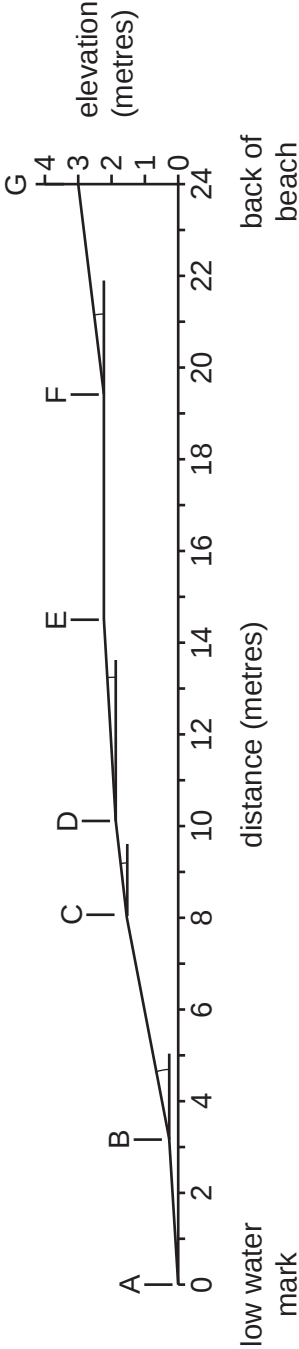

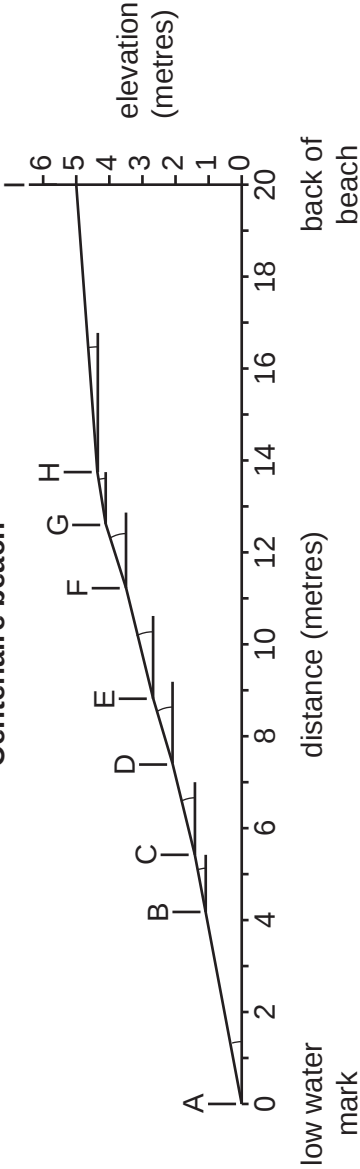

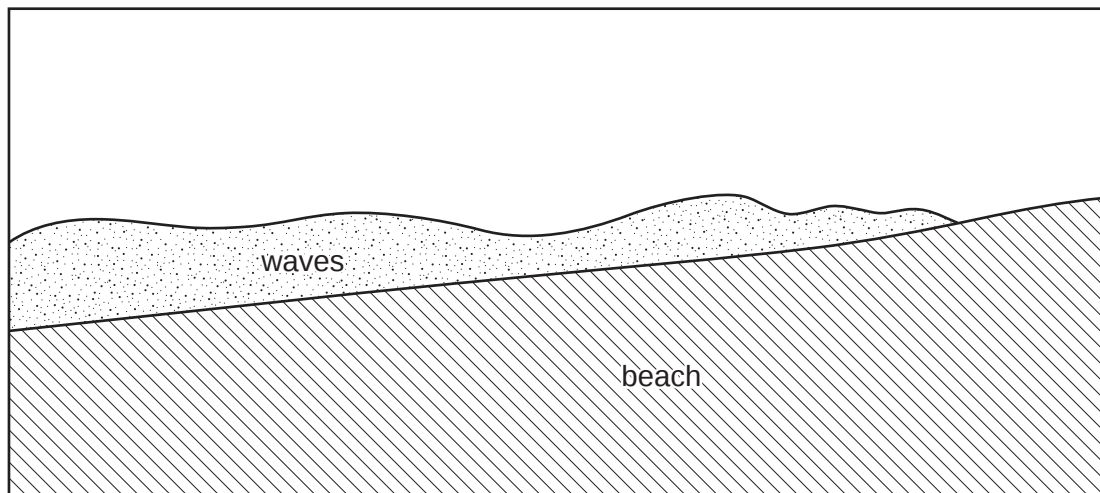

Destructive waves

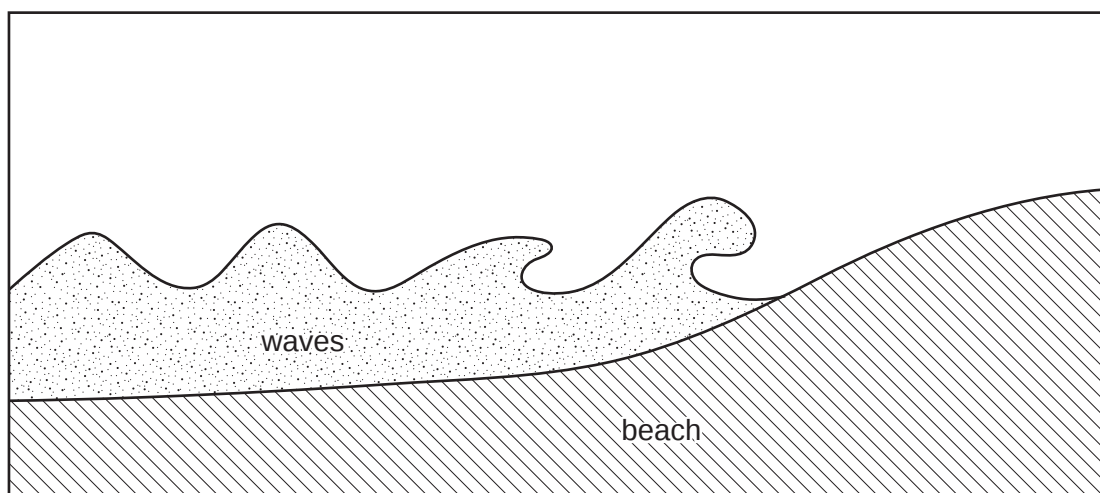
