(b) 'The Zollverein was the most important factor in the growth of German nationalism in the period from 1834 to 1850.' How far do you agree? [20]

(a) Explain why the Constituent Assembly was dissolved in January 1918. [10]

(b) 'Nicholas II's decision in 1915 to take personal command of the army caused him to lose power in February 1917.' How far do you agree? [20]

(a) Explain why it took a decade for the independent Republic of Texas to join the Union. [10]

(b) To what extent was Lincoln's victory in the 1860 election the result of the growing belief in the 'slave power'? [20]

(a) Explain why the governments of both the North and the South attempted to limit civil liberties between 1861 and 1865. [10]

(b) How significant was the impact of the constitutional amendments of 1865–70? [20]

(a) Explain why Progressive presidents changed the laws governing business. [10]

(b) 'The expansion of railroads caused the rapid industrialisation of the late nineteenth century.' How far do you agree? [20]

- (a) Explain why increasing contact with foreign powers led to significant changes within Japan in the late nineteenth century. [10]

- (a) Explain why the World Disarmament Conference (1932–34) ended without agreement. [10]

- (a) Explain why the attempt to establish parliamentary democracy in Japan failed. [10]
- (b) To what extent does dissatisfaction with the outcome of the First World War explain the May Fourth Movement? [20]
