Source 1: From Luella Miner, *A Prisoner in Peking*, published November 1900. Luella Miner, an American teacher and missionary, kept a diary in which she recorded her experiences in China. Here she comments on the Boxers' attack on the compound where she was living.

15 June:

About ten o'clock, the most horrible noise began in the south of the city. It was a horde of Boxers going through their rites. They were burning incense and shouting, 'Kill the foreign devils! (Christians). Kill! Kill! Kill!' They shouted other things, but I could only hear the 'Kill!' There may have been from twenty to fifty thousand voices making that angry noise, although not all belonged to Boxers. 5

Now, in the compound and adjoining streets, we foreigners have built barricade within barricade. The compound is said to be the best fortified place in the city now, and if we had a machine gun, we would feel even safer.

This morning, the Boxers were looting, burning and killing at the south cathedral. Ten Americans and twenty Russians went there. They killed seventy Boxers, captured ten, and took Catholic refugees to a place of safety. 10

14 August:

At last, our ears have heard the cannons of the relief army – this is the sweet music for which we have been listening for two months. Our rescue is at hand. 15

Source 2: From a report by Peng Shuzi to the Congress of the Communist International (Comintern), published November 1951. Peng had been expelled from the CCP in 1929. He then became a reporter for the Comintern, a Soviet organisation. Here he is commenting on the Chinese Civil War.

American imperialism had intended to use all its might to maintain Chiang Kai-shek's government, in order to use China as a stronghold against the Soviet Union. Consequently, at the end of the Second World War, America supplied a tremendous amount of financial aid and military equipment to Chiang's government. But America soon became aware of the extreme corruption of Chiang's administrative and military organisation. For example, most of the resources given by the US were wasted by the bureaucrats, and American-made arms often found their way into the CCP's hands because of the incompetence of the Guomindang officers. 20

On the one hand, America tried to encourage Chiang to make some reforms, such as removing a few of the most corrupt and incompetent officials and generals. On the other hand, the US plotted for a temporary compromise between Chiang and Mao, in order to gain time to destroy Mao. But Chiang not only refused to make any reforms; he also obstinately refused any compromise with Mao's party. 25 30

The result was that the US was finally forced to abandon its aid to Chiang's government and adopt a 'wait-and-see' attitude toward the CCP. This final decision by American imperialism came as a death blow to Chiang's regime.



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
