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Sources for use with Section A.

Source 1: From a report into the Soviet economy, published 1983. This report by leading Soviet academics was considered by members of the Soviet government. Here it is commenting on issues arising in the command economy by the end of Brezhnev's rule.

The structure of the national economy has become much more complex. The number of its links has grown enormously. The organisation of the national economy is now so complicated that it is not possible to control it effectively from one single centre.

The workforce does not produce satisfactory results. Many workers show a lack of interest in their work and they are not concerned about its low quality. Workers attach a low value to hard work as a means of achieving their potential, but instead they demonstrate an intense interest in consumer goods. They show a rather low level of discipline. 5

The economy is in decline. Attitudes to economic development are getting worse. Poor attitudes throughout the economy have led to a reduction in growth rates in production. Nowadays, the activities of the more talented, brave and energetic leaders are not highly valued. Instead a high value is placed on the performances of the 'obedient' chiefs, even if they cannot boast production successes. 10

Source 2: From a speech made by the Soviet leader, Mikhail Gorbachev, to the Parliament of the Russian Republic, 24 August 1991. Here Gorbachev is commenting on the failed coup.

It was the enormous numbers of Russian people that barred the road to the plotters. I also want to call particular attention to the outstanding role of the President of Russia in these events, Boris Nikolayevich Yeltsin.

The plotters miscalculation was mainly as follows:

They thought that the Union was on the verge of catastrophe, of collapse, that there would be a national calamity and that the people would support them. That was the main miscalculation of the organisers of this plot. 20

The people did not support the plotters. The people refused to follow the plotters' orders. The armed forces who were ordered into the streets took a position of principle against the coup. This is true of almost every one of them, to the last man, soldiers and officers, the overwhelming majority. 25

Therefore, the plotters' calculations, that they would be supported and that the difficulties of the country would help them in carrying out their plans, were not justified. This was the main reason for their defeat. We are already a different society and there is no place for those who want to return to the old Soviet system. 30
