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Sources for use with Section A.

Source 1: From the 'Declaration of the Immediate Causes Which Induce and Justify the Secession of South Carolina from the Federal Union', issued 24 December 1860. The Declaration was made to, and accepted by, an official Secession Convention that met in Charleston, South Carolina.

The Founding Fathers established a political system in which each state was recognised as an equal and each had separate control over its own institutions. The right of property ownership of slaves was recognised. We now believe that the Federal Government itself is trying to destroy the institution of slavery by supporting the actions of the non-slaveholding states. These states have denied the rights of property ownership recognised by the Constitution and have denounced as sinful the institution of slavery. They have encouraged and assisted thousands of our slaves to leave their homes or have incited them to insurrection. 5

For years, these pressures have been growing against the South. Now, following the recent election, an overwhelmingly northern Republican party is in charge of the Federal Government. A geographical line has been drawn across the Union. All the states north of that line have united in the election to the high office of President of the United States a man whose opinions and purposes are hostile to slavery. He is to be entrusted with the administration of the government, and he seems committed to the belief that slavery is heading towards ultimate extinction. 10 15

Next year on the 4th of March, the Republican party will take possession of the government. Then, the guarantees of the Constitution will no longer exist; the equal rights of the states will be lost. The slaveholding states will no longer have the power of self-government, or self-protection, and the Federal Government will have become their enemy. 20



Source 2: From a speech made by President Abraham Lincoln to the American people, 4 March 1861. The speech was his 'Inaugural Address' delivered in Washington DC, following his election to the Presidency in November 1860.

The people of the Southern states seem to be concerned that, by the election of a Republican administration, their institutions and property, and their peace, and personal security, are to be endangered. There is no need for such concern. I want to emphasise that the property, peace and security of any section of society will not be endangered by the incoming Republican administration. 25

The Union is permanent. Consequently, no state can lawfully get out of the Union simply by passing a resolution. Acts of violence against the authority of the United States within any state are insurrectionary. 30

I therefore consider that, in view of the Constitution, the Union is unbroken, and its principles will be defended. In doing this, there does not need to be bloodshed or violence; and there shall be none, unless it be forced upon the Federal authorities.

Plainly, the central idea of secession is the essence of anarchy. The only true system of governance of a free people is one which recognises the will of the majority, reinforced by constitutional checks and limitations. Whoever rejects the will of the majority moves towards anarchy or despotism. 35

Physically speaking, we Americans cannot separate. This country, with its institutions, belongs to the people who live in it. Whenever they grow weary of the existing government, they can exercise their constitutional right of amending it. We are not enemies, but friends. 40
