Extract 1: From Robert Hornsby, *The Impact of the Nationalist Resurgence*, published 2015.

Nationalism became a powerful force almost everywhere in the USSR in the late 1980s. This was partly due to the fact that so many leaders and elites in the different parts of the Soviet Union decided that their ultimate allegiance was not to the USSR but to their own Republic – Russia, Ukraine, Georgia or anywhere else. 5

Public demonstrations for independence in cities such as Minsk, Kiev and Tbilisi topped 100,000 people by the start of the 1990s. In the Baltic states around 2 million people held hands in a human protest chain for independence that stretched right across the region.

Nationalism was so significant because it was encouraged by a number of other issues: by economic decline, by limitations on religion and culture, by political issues, by local and national problems. It was also encouraged by the popular mood among the masses and the political manoeuvring of the local elites. One only needs to look at the 15 countries that emerged from the Soviet collapse as independent states to see that holding them together was a virtual impossibility without the use of force. 10 15

Extract 2: From Anders Aslund, *Russia's Capitalist Revolution: Why Market Reform Succeeded and Democracy Failed*, published 2007.

The sudden burst of activity in the Soviet Union during 1985–87 broke two decades of stagnation. Gorbachev's top priority was to revitalise the economy. His team tried all kind of measures, but economic growth did not improve. Shortages became worse because tax revenues declined with the anti-alcohol campaign, and a larger share of national wealth was diverted to inefficient investment. *Perestroika* fell miserably short of its main goal which was to boost economic growth. 20

Glasnost started later than the other policies and took off much more gradually. It came into its own in 1987 and freedom of speech was attained in 1989. 25

Gorbachev unleashed *glasnost* in order to undermine hard line Communist opposition to his reforms. But *glasnost* could not be controlled. It threatened not only the hardliners but the very foundations of the Soviet state, especially the state's ruthless policies against various nationalities. Rather than strengthen the Soviet state, *glasnost* eventually suggested that the Soviet Government was no longer sustainable. 30
