#### Option 2B.1: Luther and the German Reformation, c1515–55

##### Source for use with Question 1(a).

**Source 1:** From the Edict of Worms issued by Charles V in May 1521. Charles ordered that it be read and enforced throughout the Holy Roman Empire.

None of you can be in any doubt how far the errors of Luther depart from true Christian beliefs. Hence it is our duty to proceed against this festering disease as follows.

We declare that Luther shall be hated and condemned by all of the Electors and nobles of the Empire. We declare that the sentence and condemnation in the Papal Bull, which our Holy Father issued, shall be put into immediate effect. 5

Our strict order is that after twenty days, you shall refuse to assist Luther, openly or secretly, in any way. Wherever you meet him, you shall take him prisoner and deliver him to us. As for the books of Luther, which our Holy Father has condemned, we order that no one shall keep or print any of them nor shall any one defend them. For they are foul and ridiculous, the work of a notorious heretic. 10

##### Source for use with Question 1(b).

**Source 2:** From Erasmus, *In Praise of Folly*, published 1511. Erasmus was an internationally-famous humanist scholar whose books sold widely in early sixteenth-century Germany.

Priests are so widely hated and despised that even a chance meeting with one of them in the street is thought to bring bad luck. Yet they are gloriously self-satisfied. They truly believe themselves to be highly dedicated to their religion even though they are so uneducated that they can't even read. Then when they bray like donkeys in church, repeating passages from the Bible which they've learned by heart and haven't understood, they imagine they are pleasing God. Many of them make a good living begging for bread from door to door and making a nuisance of themselves in every inn. This is the way in which these individuals, in all their filth and ignorance and all their crude and shameless behaviour, claim to imitate the apostles. 15 20

As for the Popes, they make no attempt to copy Christ's life of poverty or his teachings. They are the deadliest enemies of the Church. They allow Christ to be forgotten by misrepresenting his words and wounding him with their poisonous way of life. 25

## Option 2B.2: The Dutch Revolt, c1563–1609

### Source for use with Question 2(a).

**Source 3:** From the treaty establishing the Union of Utrecht, 1579.

1. These provinces will ally and unite as if they were but one province.
2. These provinces will assist each other against all acts of violence made by His Majesty King Philip.
3. These provinces will support and defend each other against all foreign or other lords who wish to attack them. 5
4. In order to protect these provinces against all force, it has been decided that frontier towns and other towns (where this is thought necessary) shall be fortified and strengthened. They shall also be garrisoned by soldiers.
5. In order to meet the expenses which must be incurred for the defence of these united provinces, it is agreed that taxes will be collected on wine, beer, salt, corn, cattle and other such goods as may be agreed upon. 10
6. No peace treaty will be made by any of these provinces except by the unanimous consent of them all.

### Source for use with Question 2(b).

**Source 4:** From a pamphlet issued by William of Orange in September 1568. It was addressed to the people of the Netherlands shortly before his attempted invasion.

The Netherlands have always been ruled in accordance with our traditional rights and privileges which have been respected for many centuries. Those who have ruled us have always sworn on oath to maintain these rights and privileges. Therefore, the inhabitants of the Netherlands owe obedience to those who rule us now, only on condition that our rights and privileges are protected. 15

It is also plain that, for over fifty years since the Netherlands and Spain came together under one king, some in Spain have been intent on establishing a tyranny here. This has been done in the name of religion as well as the service of the king. It is because of this that many cruel persecutions and bloody laws have been introduced. And now, since the Duke arrived with his Spanish soldiers, we see how cruel these oppressors have become. As a result, we have been brought into unbearable slavery. Our privileges and rights, together with the religion of God, are lying destroyed. 20 25
