Marking guidance for examiners

Summary of assessment objectives for Question 1

Question 1 assesses assessment objective 2. This assessment objective is focused on the ability to analyse and evaluate different ways in which aspects of the past have been interpreted. The total mark awarded to this question is 30.

The structure of the mark scheme

The mark scheme for Question 1 has two parts:

- advice on each specific question outlining indicative content which can be used to assess the quality of the specific response. This content is not prescriptive and candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to. Assessors should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates.
- an assessment grid advising which bands and marks should be given to responses which demonstrate the qualities needed in assessment objective 2.

Deciding on the mark awarded within a band

The first stage for an examiner is to decide the overall band. The second stage is to decide how firmly the qualities expected for that band are displayed. Thirdly a final mark for the question can then be awarded.

INDICATIVE CONTENT FOR QUESTION 1

NOTE: This content is not prescriptive and candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to below. Assessors should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates. Each answer will be assessed on its merits according to the assessment grid as well as the indicative content.

With reference to the sources and your understanding of the historical context, assess the value of these three sources to an historian studying political change in France from 1795-1799.

Candidates are expected to demonstrate their ability to analyse and evaluate a range of primary source material with a high degree of discrimination. Source evaluation skills should focus on discussing the strengths and the limitations of the sources in their historical context. To judge value to an historian, there should also be analysis and evaluation of the content and the authorship of the primary sources.

In analysing and evaluating the provided source material, candidates may deploy knowledge and understanding from their previous learning. Credit may be given if previous learning is used to show understanding of the historical context if appropriate.

Candidates will consider the value of the sources to an historian studying political change in France from 1795-1799. Understanding of the historical context should also be demonstrated to analyse and evaluate the value of the sources to the particular enquiry. Appropriate observations in the analysis and evaluation of the sources may include:

- Source A is an official proclamation issued by the Directory on 5th November 1795 to explain why it has been established and what its aims and objectives are. Candidates should use their understanding of the historical context to identify this source as being valuable to an historian studying political change in France between 1795-1799 as it outlines a series of problem identified by the newly established Constitution. Scrutiny of the content of the source will show that in 1795 there were significant political problems which needed addressing. The tone of the source is positive in a self-promoting sort of way. It is political propaganda from a newly established regime keen to win popular support. In this way, Source A is of considerable value to an historian studying political change in France between 1795-1799 as it shows why the Directory, according to its own propaganda, came into being
- The context regarding political problems in Source A is corroborated by that of Source B. Candidates should use their understanding of the historical context to identify this source as coming from the manifesto of the Conspiracy of Equals which was launched by Gracchus Babeuf in 1796. This source is particularly valuable in studying political change in France because it suggests that far from being able to establish the desired for era of political stability, the Directory was quickly challenged by an extremist left wing plot. The author is Gracchus Babeuf, an extreme left wing agitator determined to move the Republic in a far more egalitarian direction. This gives the historian valuable evidence of political instability in the period of which this is but one example. Others may demonstrate contextual knowledge of other right wing royalist plots that challenged the Directory at this time.

• While Sources A and B show political instability, Source C is suggesting a solution to the problems. Candidates should use their understanding of the historical context to identify this source as clear propaganda in favour of Napoleon Bonaparte as the saviour of the Republic from fanaticism and anarchy on both left and right. The source is valuable in demonstrating how the political problems which the Directory hoped to resolve in 1795 were not tackled – in fact they were made much worse as the context behind Source C would suggest. The tone of the visual source is one of despair which only one individual can resolve. Bonaparte is the only man who can save the Republic from falling to the abyss of chaos and anarchy. The artist gets across the message by portraying figures in the guise of angels (peace, harmony and prosperity) and demons (chaos anarchy)

Overall, candidates will provide a judgment regarding the value of the sources to an historian studying political change in France from 1795-1799, and are able to demonstrate that value through consideration of the tone and nature of the presented sources and understanding of the historical context.

QUESTIONS 2 AND 3

Marking guidance for examiners

Summary of assessment objectives for Question 2 and 3

Both questions assess assessment objective 1. This assessment objective is a single element focused on the ability to analyse and evaluate and reach substantiated judgements. The mark awarded to each question chosen in this section is 30.

The structure of the mark scheme

The mark scheme for Unit 3 has two parts:

- advice on each specific question outlining indicative content which can be used to
 assess the quality of the specific response. This content is not prescriptive and
 candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to. Assessors
 should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates.
- an assessment grid advising which bands and marks should be given to responses which demonstrate the qualities needed in assessment objective 1.
- the assessment grid for questions 1 and 2 and that for question 3 differ in that the assessment for question 3 expects candidates to demonstrate understanding of change and/or development over the long term (at least 100 years).

Deciding on the mark awarded within a band

The first stage for an examiner is to decide the overall band. The second stage is to decide how firmly the qualities expected for that band are displayed. Thirdly a final mark for the question can then be awarded.

Organisation and communication

This issue should have a bearing if the standard of organisation and communication is inconsistent with the descriptor for the band in which the answer falls. In this situation, examiners may decide not to award the highest mark within the band.

INDICATIVE CONTENT FOR QUESTION 2

NOTE: This content is not prescriptive and candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to below. Assessors should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates. Each answer will be assessed on its merits according to the assessment grid as well as the indicative content.

How far do you agree that the main reason for the Terror was to defeat the counter-revolution?

Candidates are expected to consider and debate the full range of issues that affected the key concept in the question – in this case whether the main reason for the Terror was to defeat the counter-revolution. They will consider a range of key concepts such as causation, consequence, continuity, change and significance where appropriate and also the relationship between the key characteristics and features associated with the issue in the question.

In addressing the context of the set question, candidates may deploy knowledge and understanding from their previous learning. Credit may be given if the knowledge and understanding deployed helps to address the specific question set.

Candidates will offer an analysis and evaluation of the Terror and its origins. In order to reach a substantiated judgement about this issue, candidates may argue that the Terror was indeed caused by the need to defeat the counter-revolution. The response might support the proposition by considering:

- the counter-revolution posed a fundamental threat to the survival of the Republic
- in the Vendee a determined guerrilla campaign was being waged against the Republic
- the Federal revolt was widespread and diminished republican authority in the majority of the newly created departments
- there was a grave risk that the counter-revolutionaries might extend their desire for international support to Frances enemies as they had done it Toulon

Candidates might consider challenging the proposition in the question by arguing that there were other important causes of the Terror in addition to the aim of defeating the counter-revolution. The response might consider:

- the external threat was far more pressing as the Austrians and Prussians were able to deploy greater numbers of combatants who were well armed professional soldiers
- a central aim of the Terror was to firmly establish democratic republicanism (as promised by the Constitution of 1793) once the various threats had been removed
- the need to re-shape the French society in a more egalitarian way
- the desire to destroy all vestiges of the ancien regime particularly the Catholic Church

Overall candidates will offer a debate and come to a substantiated judgement regarding whether the main reason for the Terror was to defeat the counter-revolution.

INDICATIVE CONTENT FOR QUESTION 3

NOTE: This content is not prescriptive and candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to below. Assessors should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates. Each answer will be assessed on its merits according to the assessment grid as well as the indicative content.

How successful was the Emperor Napoleon I (1804-1815) in preserving the gains of the Revolution?

Candidates are expected to consider and debate the full range of issues that affected the key concept in the question – in this case whether the Emperor Napoleon was successful in preserving the gains of the Revolution. They will consider a range of key concepts such as causation, consequence, continuity, change and significance where appropriate and also the relationship between the key characteristics and features associated with the issue in the question.

In addressing the context of the set question, candidates may deploy knowledge and understanding from their previous learning. Credit may be given if the knowledge and understanding deployed helps to address the specific question set.

Candidates will offer an analysis and evaluation of whether the Emperor Napoleon was successful in preserving the gains of the Revolution. In order to reach a substantiated judgment about the issue, candidates may argue that the causes of the two rebellions had much in common. The response might support the proposition by considering:

- the Napoleonic Code enshrined some of the gains made by the Revolution namely equality for all before the law
- the notion of the career open to the talents meant that humble birth would not in theory be a barrier to advancement as long as an individual was talented and able
- the land purchased by individual when church property was nationalised was not to be returned
- tax exemptions for the privileged and the feudal system remained abolished

Candidates might consider challenging the proposition in the question by arguing that while in some respects Napoleon preserved the gains of the Revolution, in other ways he destroyed them. The response might consider:

- the Concordat effectively restored the Catholic Church to its position of primacy in France. The separation of church and state was ended.
- the *legion d'honeur* and the re-establishment of the nobility destroyed a key element of the revolution that all should be equal as citizens and titles be abolished
- France embarked on acquiring territory and governing these in an imperial way the universal empire based on force not fraternity
- there was strict control over the media and freedom of expression was effectively ended.

Overall candidates will offer a debate and come to a substantiated judgement regarding whether the Emperor Napoleon was successful in preserving the gains of the Revolution.
