Marking guidance for examiners

Summary of assessment objectives for Question 1

Question 1 assesses assessment objective 2. This assessment objective is focused on the ability to analyse and evaluate different ways in which aspects of the past have been interpreted. The total mark awarded to this question is 30.

The structure of the mark scheme

The mark scheme for Question 1 has two parts:

- advice on each specific question outlining indicative content which can be used to assess the quality of the specific response. This content is not prescriptive and candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to. Assessors should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates.
- an assessment grid advising which bands and marks should be given to responses which demonstrate the qualities needed in assessment objective 2.

Deciding on the mark awarded within a band

The first stage for an examiner is to decide the overall band. The second stage is to decide how firmly the qualities expected for that band are displayed. Thirdly a final mark for the question can then be awarded.

INDICATIVE CONTENT FOR QUESTION 1

NOTE: This content is not prescriptive and candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to below. Assessors should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates. Each answer will be assessed on its merits according to the assessment grid as well as the indicative content.

With reference to the sources and your understanding of the historical context, assess the value of these three sources to an historian studying emancipation in the Civil War 1861-1863.

Candidates are expected to demonstrate their ability to analyse and evaluate a range of primary source material with a high degree of discrimination. Source evaluation skills should focus on discussing the strengths and the limitations of the primary sources in their historical context. To judge value to an historian, there should also be analysis and evaluation of the content and the authorship of the primary sources.

In analysing and evaluating the provided source material, candidates may deploy knowledge and understanding from their previous learning. Credit may be given if previous learning is used to show understanding of the historical context if appropriate.

Candidates will consider the value of the sources to an historian studying emancipation in the Civil War 1861-1863. Understanding of the historical context should also be demonstrated to analyse and evaluate the value of the sources to the particular enquiry. Appropriate observations in the analysis and evaluation of the sources may include:

- Source A is a newspaper report about Fremont's controversial Proclamation about emancipation of the slaves in his military area at a very early stage in the Civil War. The source provides the immediate context for this decision and the reaction of Lincoln. He was furious with Fremont for undermining his border strategy and refused to back it in fact he ordered Fremont to rescind his Proclamation. Radicals were disappointed with Lincoln's caution, which is directly criticised in the extract, laying bare the division within the northern ranks about the issue. Lincoln's sensitivity was heightened by the fact that Fremont had been the party's candidate in the 1856 election. The newspaper is also critical of the caution on the issue of slavery being displayed by the government. However it certainly foreshadows the debate in 1862 and reveals how far Lincoln had travelled by that stage. It was a very popular publication and it makes no attempt to hide its sympathies on the issue showing no empathy with Lincoln's difficulties in keeping the border states loyal and appealing to what he hoped were loyalists in the South. It provides valuable contemporary evidence to an historian studying the issue of emancipation during the early Civil War
- Source B on the other hand is Lincoln himself writing in a private letter justifying his actions to a friend. Here the context is different and Lincoln is using the events of the war to justify his action in issuing his Emancipation Proclamation. He cleverly refers to the views of some of his commanders who were not abolitionists and who testify to the effectiveness of the Proclamation in winning the war. However this letter goes beyond the military reasoning used by Lincoln. Lincoln's motives are also bound up with his concept of freedom and his belief in the rightness of his move. The debate on the constitutional aspects of the decision are also laid bare in this document. It is also a private letter to a friend and candidates may comment on Lincoln's technique in persuading his friend to accept his arguments. The source is very valuable to a study of emancipation in the Civil War as it is emphasising Lincoln's reasonableness and also in marshalling his arguments. There is a dig about African Americans being prepared to fight for the Union. Candidates should further comment on the provenance of the source as written to a friend where we can glimpse the real Lincoln

• Source C is another letter with a different context - both writer and recipient were in different political camps from Lincoln. Here the context is the impact of the Emancipation Proclamation in the South itself. The content of the source provides examples of the way emancipation was working and how slaves knew about it so soon. It effectively undermined the Confederacy encouraging large numbers of slaves to escape as was demonstrated by the advance of Sherman into the South later in the war. It is remarkably good first hand evidence and is of considerable value in studying emancipation but it is tempered by the fact that Cooper is a leading abolitionist who was writing to a Democrat bitterly opposed to the emancipation proclamation. It goes some way to corroborate Lincoln's estimate of the effect of emancipation in Source B. The provenance of a private letter between opponents should be commented upon

Overall, candidates will provide a judgment regarding the value of the sources to an historian studying emancipation in the Civil War 1861- 1863 and are able to demonstrate that value through consideration of the tone and nature of the presented sources and understanding of the historical context.

QUESTIONS 2 AND 3

Marking guidance for examiners

Summary of assessment objectives for Question 2 and 3

Both questions assess assessment objective 1. This assessment objective is a single element focused on the ability to analyse and evaluate and reach substantiated judgements. The mark awarded to each question chosen in this section is 30.

The structure of the mark scheme

The mark scheme for Unit 3 has two parts:

- advice on each specific question outlining indicative content which can be used to
 assess the quality of the specific response. This content is not prescriptive and
 candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to. Assessors
 should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates.
- an assessment grid advising which bands and marks should be given to responses which demonstrate the qualities needed in assessment objective 1.
- the assessment grid for questions 1 and 2 and that for question 3 differ in that the assessment for question 3 expects candidates to demonstrate understanding of change and/or development over the long term (at least 100 years).

Deciding on the mark awarded within a band

The first stage for an examiner is to decide the overall band. The second stage is to decide how firmly the qualities expected for that band are displayed. Thirdly a final mark for the question can then be awarded.

Organisation and communication

This issue should have a bearing if the standard of organisation and communication is inconsistent with the descriptor for the band in which the answer falls. In this situation, examiners may decide not to award the highest mark within the band.

INDICATIVE CONTENT FOR QUESTION 2

NOTE: This content is not prescriptive and candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to below. Assessors should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates. Each answer will be assessed on its merits according to the assessment grid as well as the indicative content.

How far do you agree that the North won the Civil War mainly because of superior military leadership?

Candidates are expected to consider and debate the full range of issues that affected the key concept in the question – in this case whether the North won the Civil War because of superior military leadership. They will consider a range of key concepts such as causation, consequence, continuity, change and significance where appropriate and also the relationship between the key characteristics and features associated with the issue in the question.

In addressing the context of the set question, candidates may deploy knowledge and understanding from their previous learning. Credit may be given if the knowledge and understanding deployed helps to address the specific question set.

Candidates will offer an analysis and evaluation of reasons for the North's victory in the Civil War. In order to reach a substantiated judgment about this issue, candidates may argue that the North did indeed win because of superior military leadership. The response might consider supporting the proposition by considering:

- Lincoln's record as a wartime president and leader
- the weakness of Jefferson Davies as a military leader of the confederacy
- the superior strategy of Grant and Sherman 1864-1865
- Confederate strategic mistakes 1862-1863 in the east
- weak Confederate military leadership in the western theatre of war

Candidates might consider challenging the proposition in the question by arguing that other factors were more responsible for the Northern victory in the Civil War. Indeed poor Northern military leadership in 1861-1862 may even have prolonged the war. The response might consider:

- Northern financial and economic resources
- Northern industrial might
- the emancipation strategy employed by Lincoln
- the effect of the naval blockade
- lack of foreign recognition and support for the South

Overall candidates will offer a debate and come to a substantiated judgement regarding whether the North won the Civil War mainly because of superior military leadership.

INDICATIVE CONTENT FOR QUESTION 3

NOTE: This content is not prescriptive and candidates are not expected to mention all the material referred to below. Assessors should seek to credit any further admissible evidence offered by candidates. Each answer will be assessed on its merits according to the assessment grid as well as the indicative content.

'The violent resistance of white southerners was mainly responsible for the failure of reconstruction.' Discuss.

Candidates are expected to consider and debate the full range of issues that affected the key concept in the question – in this case the effect of violent white southerner resistance on the failure of reconstruction. They will consider a range of key concepts such as causation, consequence, continuity, change and significance where appropriate and also the relationship between the key characteristics and features associated with the issue in the question.

In addressing the context of the set question, candidates may deploy knowledge and understanding from their previous learning. Credit may be given if the knowledge and understanding deployed helps to address the specific question set.

Candidates will offer an analysis and evaluation of the reasons for the failure of Reconstruction. In order to reach a substantiated judgment about the issue, candidates may argue that violent resistance by white southerners was mainly responsible for the failure of reconstruction. The response might consider supporting the proposition by considering:

- the campaign of resistance by white southerners
- Ku Klux Klan activism reaching a peak in 1869-1871
- the failure of the Force Acts 1870-1871
- the spread of terrorism, violence and intimidation in the deep South fatally undermined republicanism

Candidates might consider challenging the proposition in the question by arguing that other factors were more important in explaining the failure of reconstruction. The response might consider:

- the depression of the 1870s and stagnation of demand for cotton stymies economic recovery
- factionalism and corruption undermining legitimacy of new governments and the Freedman Bureau
- the failure of republicanism to appeal politically to white southerners
- the failure of Northern administrations to enforce reconstruction
- success of conservatives in killing off reconstruction in political horse trading in 1876-1877

Overall candidates will offer a debate and come to a substantiated judgement regarding the failure of reconstruction and the role played in its failure by violent resistance by white southerners.
