The Anglo-Scottish conflict tested Edward's army in a way that his other wars had not done. The Scottish knew to choose the right terrain to fight on, such as Stirling Bridge. They avoided large-scale battles.

However, at Falkirk in 1298 the English had to overcome the Scottish formations known as schiltrons, when the English archers proved their importance. Edward's sieges were a key part of the Scottish wars, such as at Stirling castle. The English relied heavily on the use of equipment; such as trebuchets, catapults, and movable siege towers.
