
Background Information



What will be the o ne quene s of ae ptane by the Southern States of the rule of Abolitionism at Wals ington, in the person of Lino In?

The first one quene must be a powerful one lidation of the strength of the Abolition party of the North. If after all the threats of rest and distance, the Southern States stability, the demoralisation of the South will be omplete. Immediate danger will be brought to base ry in all Frontier States and the underground railroad will be ome an overground railroad.

Before Lino In a n be installed in Wals ington the Southern States a n dis lee peae ably their union with the North. If we do not dis lee our union with the North, we make the triumph of our Abolition enemies o mplete. If the South ae pts the rule of Abolitionis s there is an end of all peae ful e paration of the Union. We a n then only ea pe by war. The ruin of the South will be the los of liberty, property, home, o untry — er ry hing that make s life worth hair ng.

SOURCE D

I am of the opinion that it would be unwise for the Southern to ates to ended, if Lino In were to be elected. I believe that in the Union we would to ill be able to reis to aggress one against the equal rights of the people of the Southern to ates. We would to ill have a majority in the US Senate opposed to the abolitionitists. Without the one not of that body no law on uld be passed. We have also the US Supreme Court, whose opinions are favourable to the equality, both of persons and of property. We also have a majority of the United States opposed to the faction of white Lino In its the head.

Do not o nis der any o mpromie in regard to the extens on of save ry. The intent of u do, they have us beaten; all our labour is los, and so oner or later will have to be done all over again. Douglas is so re to be again triying to bring in his 'Popular Sover reignty'. Have none of it. The onflict has to ome and better now than later. You know I think the fugitive save to ause of the onto itution ought to be enfore donateless it ought not to be reisted.

A letter from Lincoln to William Kellogg, 11 December 1860. Kellogg, a Republican congressman, had proposed a compromise including an extension to the Missouri Compromise line.

The people of Georgia have dis lee d their politia I o nnet ion with the Government of the United States of America. For the last tengerars we have had numerous a uses of omplaint against non-base-holding States. They have endeavoured to weaken our sour introduction of unity, to disturb our domestic pease and tranquillity. The Federal Government has tried to deprive us of an equal enjoying ent of the ommon Territories of the Republic This hostile policy has placed the two socious of the Union for many spars in the ondition of unital civil war. Ree not see not shave fully demonstrated the nee is ty of so paration.

Northern States have by a large majority o mmitted the Government of the United States into the hands of the party of Lino In, a lled the Republia n party, which under its present name and organiation, is openly an anti-bave ry party. While it supports was eand or rruption in the administration of Government, anti-bave ry is its miseon and its purpose.

Background Information

Jaruze Ik bea me leader of Poland on 18 Ot ober 1981 bea use the Soivet Union had beo me disatistic with the at ions of Kania in dealing with Solidarity and the strikes and protess that were or rring at os Poland. However, under Jaruze Isk, these ontinued, and even got worse. On 13 Dee mber Jaruze Ik announced to the Polise people that he was imposing martial law. Some his orians that he was preserved to do this by the Soivet Union, while others that he was triying to avoid a Soivet military invasion.

How to rong a leader was Jaruze Ita ? Was he being told what to do by the Soiv et Union or was he in o ntrol?


SOURCE C

On 13 Deember there was no other way of avoiding the disintegration of the state. Where was Poland going? How long of uld the of untry, torn by strikes, aflame with tensions and sinking in a climate of artificially cleated hatred, have of notinued to sorve? There is still room in Poland for responsible, independent unions and the democratication begun laster are will of notinue. It states that the reports of alleged tens or hundreds of fatal as alties of thouse nds arrested, held in the freezing of notitions beaten up and tortured, are a lie. One a nnot hide the truth about Poland in Poland. Sooner or later, it will be known to the whole world.
