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Sources for use with Section A.

Source A: From a diary entry by Reverend John Walker, July 1916. He was the army chaplain at Casualty Clearing Station 21. Here he is writing about the start of the Battle of the Somme.

1 July 1916

The wounded begin to come in. All day long, dying and wounded arrive. The numbers are piling up; all the beds are full and they are lucky to get a space on the floor. Many will die before they can be operated on. We already have 1500 wounded soldiers here and still more come.

3 July 1916

A thousand badly wounded soldiers are arriving every day. Our wards, tents and huts are all crammed with terribly wounded men.

Source B: From a letter written by Vera Brittain to her mother, December 1917. Vera was working as a nurse in a hospital on the Western Front.

Morning work (making beds, washing the patients, taking their temperatures, giving them medicine) starts here at 3.30 am!

The cold is terrible. The windows of the ward are all covered with icicles. I am doing my work wearing an extra woollen jumper and a long coat. Our kettles, hot water bottles and sponges are all frozen hard. All the taps freeze, so we have to limit the amount of water given to patients. Any water spilt on the ground turns to ice in a few seconds.
