Study Source A below and then answer Question 1.

Source A: From *Report from a Chinese Village* by Jan Myrdal, published in 1965. Myrdal was a European who lived in a Chinese village for a month in 1962.

Before Mao, women in the village only did housework. Now, they also work in the fields and earn their own money.

But the older men in the village still say, 'What does a woman know? Women know nothing! What is a woman worth? Women are worth nothing!'

In these village families the men decide everything and their wives say, 'We are only women. We are not allowed to say anything.'

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Sources/interpretations for use with Section B.

Source B: From an article in an American news magazine, published in December 1952. The title of the article was *The 'Three-Anti' and 'Five-Anti' Movements in Communist China*.

The 'antis' campaigns have increased the power of the CCP. The state now has much greater control over the economy. In the campaigns, the CCP has taken a big step forward in placing private businesses under the control of the state. The CCP has also claimed that its actions have led to the people of China paying lower prices for their goods.

The two campaigns have also provided the state with additional money through the collection of fines and the confiscation of property. The Deputy Minister of Finance reported that the overall economic situation was much improved as a consequence of these campaigns.

Source C: An official photograph taken in 1952. It shows a public trial, which was held as part of the 'antis' campaigns.



Interpretation 1: From a history website.

There were many victims of the 'antis' campaigns. Thousands of ordinary people were used as spies for the government. Many important people were accused of corruption. They were dragged to public meetings, where they were accused and humiliated. Many people lost hope after losing their property, jobs and incomes.

The 'antis' campaigns created a climate of fear across China, forcing those who disagreed with CCP policies into obedience. The death toll from these campaigns is unknown, but is probably close to one million people.

Interpretation 2: From *The Three and Five Antis Campaign* by Stephanie Chung, published 2009.

The 'antis' campaigns allowed the CCP to expand its power over China, and gain control of the Chinese economy. The campaign targeted those in industry and government who had too many connections with China's capitalists. The CCP were able to seize factories and money from people who had been accused of crimes such as bribery or not paying their taxes.

As a result of the campaigns, the CCP increased its control over China even more by recruiting new members. The number of party members increased from 2.7 million in 1947 to 6.1 million in 1953.
