Interpretation B

An image depicting the situation in Tenochtitlán just before the Spanish flight from the city in July 1520.

It is from a collection of 80 images called 'El Lienzo de Tlaxcala'. These images were created by native artists in the middle of the 1500s for the town council of Tlaxcala. The images show the actions of the Tlaxcalans at different times during the conquest of Mexico.

The people in the centre of this image are the Spanish and the Tlaxcalans. Cortés is in the centre with hat and beard. Doña Marina is just behind him. The other people are the Aztecs.
