

The issue of equal pay led to industrial action, such as that by the women at Ford. The government worried that if they didn't act, the issue would be forced by strikes. So today marks 50 years since the 1970 Equal Pay Act was passed – a significant moment in the history of women's rights in the UK. While the battle for equality continues, this was the defining moment in changing women's lives.
