Study the source below and then answer the question which follows.

Source A

The illness began to spread in the city, killing a vast number of our people. It was so dreadful that no one could walk or move. The sick were so utterly helpless that they could only lie on their beds like corpses, unable to move even their heads. If they did move their bodies, they screamed with pain. A great many died from this plague, and many others died of hunger. They could not resist the Spanish invaders.

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QUESTION 2

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Study the source below and then answer the question which follows.

Source B

It must be told how the Spaniards murdered the Mexicans who were celebrating the Fiesta of Huitzilopochtli in the Patio of the Gods. When everyone was enjoying the celebration, the Spaniards determined to kill people. They came armed for battle. They attacked all the people, stabbing them, spearing them, wounding them with their swords. They cut off the heads of some and smashed the heads of others into pieces. The Spaniards murdered them and laughed.

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QUESTION 3

Study the interpretations below and then answer the question which follows.

Interpretation 1

Successful developments in ship design, particularly in masts and rigging, changed the nature of exploring voyages. They could sail faster, closer to the wind and were much easier to steer. These developments, helped by improvements in navigational aids such as the quadrant and compass, led to the European voyages of discovery.

Interpretation 2

The era was defined by its religious fervour and by the continuing belief in a form of militant Christianity. The idea of spreading the Catholic faith to the heathen races was the main reason for Portuguese and Spanish explorers to undertake their voyages of discovery. Other factors were of far less significance.

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
