QUESTION 1

Study the source below and then answer the question which follows.

Source A

Columbus thought the natives were taking up arms with what were in reality ridiculous weapons such as spears and bows, so he hurried to crush the people of the entire island. He chose 2000 foot-soldiers, 20 cavalry, with many crossbows, lances, swords and even cannon. He also used a more terrible weapon – 20 hunting dogs that were turned loose and immediately tore the natives apart.

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QUESTION 2

Study the source below and then answer the question which follows.

Source B

What was the purpose of Source B?

Our boats entered the lake and broke through the enemy's fleet of canoes. The warriors who were in them did not resist. There seemed to be persons of importance in one canoe. Our people leaped into it, and seized Cuauhtémoc, the Aztec chief. I spoke to him and told him not to fear. With the chief being taken prisoner, the war ended. Your Majesty will see what dangers and disasters your subjects endured and how much they risked their lives to achieve success.

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QUESTION 3

Study the interpretations below and then answer the question which follows.

Interpretation 1

The Aztecs were a remarkable people, fearless warriors and great builders. The sacrificial aspect of their religion appalled the Spaniards. But, beyond the ritual violence there was a highly specialised and cultured civilization. There was a sophisticated farming economy, a large trading network and an outlook that was in contact with the earth, sky and seasons.

[Dr Richard Townsend, an expert on Aztec culture, writing in his academic book The Aztecs, published in 1992]

Interpretation 2

The degree of culture which the Aztecs had reached was not superior to that of any of the other tribes in the area. Indeed, in some respects it was below that of many other Indian tribes. To their gods, human victims were sacrificed in various ways and in large numbers. The victims were obtained in warfare and suffered cruel tortures and executions.

[From an entry on the Aztecs, published in the Catholic Encyclopaedia between 1907 and 1912. The Encyclopaedia is devoted to Catholic interests, actions and teachings.]

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QUESTION 4

Study the sources below and then answer the question which follows.

Source C

The Tlaxcalans had been at war with the Cholullans, so they told the Spaniards: 'They are our enemy and friends of the Aztecs.' The Spaniards went to Cholula and demanded all nobles and men of the town to assemble in the courtyard. When they had gathered, the Spaniards blocked the entrances. Without warning, they were treacherously slain because the Tlaxcalans persuaded the Spaniards to do it.

Source D

He (Cortés) said: 'How anxious these traitors are to see us among the ravines so that they can gorge themselves on our flesh. But our lord will prevent it.' Cortés then asked the Cholullans why they had turned traitors. Their hostility was plain to see, as was their treachery. Cortés stated that the King of Spain's laws decreed that treachery must not go unpunished and thus began our revenge.

[Bernal Díaz, a Spanish conquistador, writing in *The Conquest of New Spain*, published in the sixteenth century. Díaz served under Cortés during the conquest of Mexico.]
