This question is about the problem of religion.

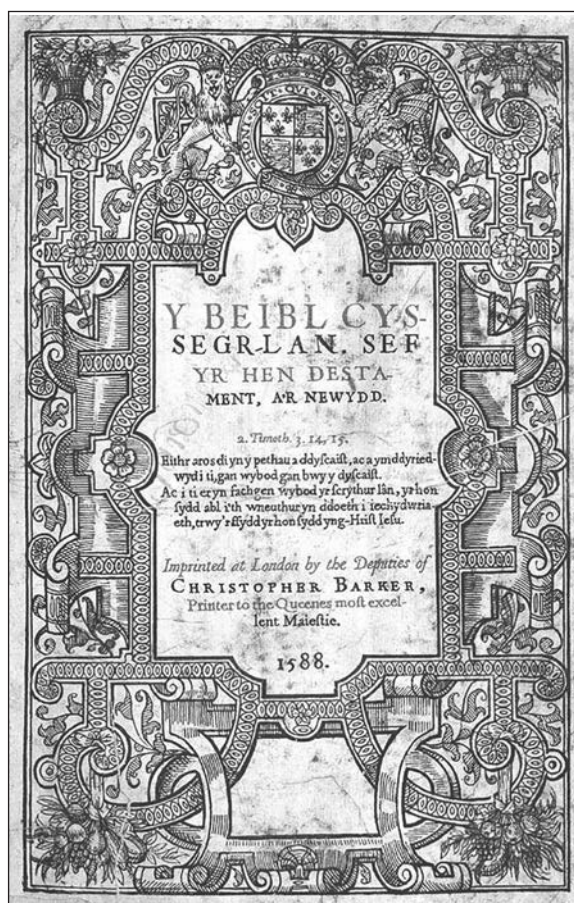
Study the sources below and then answer the question which follows.
