






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
9. The diagram shows the variation with time t of the magnetic flux density B of the field linking a coil.





The primary coil is connected to a mains supply where V_{rms} is 230 V.

The secondary coil is connected to a lamp of resistance 6.0 Ω .

The transformer is 100% efficient.
