### Subject-specific Marking Instructions

- Accept any clear, unambiguous response (including mis-spellings of scientific terms if they are *phonetically* correct, but always check the guidance column for exclusions).
- If a candidate alters his/her response, examiners should accept the alteration.
- Crossed out answers should be considered only if no other response has been made. When marking crossed out responses, accept correct answers which are clear and unambiguous.

e.g. for a one-mark question where ticks in the third and fourth boxes are required for the mark:

- The list principle:  
If a list of responses greater than the number requested is given, work through the list from the beginning. Award one mark for each correct response, ignore any neutral response, and deduct one mark for any incorrect response, e.g. one which has an error of science. If the number of incorrect responses is equal to or greater than the number of correct responses, no marks are awarded. A neutral response is correct but irrelevant to the question.

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e. Marking method for tick-box questions:

If there is a set of boxes, some of which should be ticked and others left empty, then judge the entire set of boxes.

If there is at least one tick, ignore crosses and other markings. If there are no ticks, accept clear, unambiguous indications, e.g. shading or crosses. Credit should be given according to the instructions given in the guidance column for the question. If more boxes are ticked than there are correct answers, then deduct one mark for each additional tick. Candidates cannot score less than zero marks.

e.g. if a question requires candidates to identify cities in England:

2	<p><b>Level 3:</b> There is a correctly labelled diagram showing 3 sections: core mantle and crust. The candidate may identify some layers of the Earth correctly as solid or liquid. The candidate may identify earthquake waves as P and S waves OR make a relevant comment regarding plate movement. Quality of written communication does not impede communication of the science at this level. <b>(5 – 6 marks)</b></p> <p><b>Level 2:</b> A diagram consists of at least 2 concentric circles and is partially labelled. Candidate may be aware that earthquake waves can be P and S waves OR may make a relevant comment about the structure of the Earth. Quality of written communication partly impedes communication of the science at this level. <b>(3 – 4 marks)</b></p> <p><b>Level 1:</b> The candidate may attempt to draw a diagram to represent the Earth OR make a relevant comment about the structure of the Earth. They may show awareness of either P or S waves. Quality of written communication impedes communication of the science at this level. <b>(1 – 2 marks)</b></p> <p><b>Level 0:</b> Insufficient or irrelevant science. Quality of written communication does not impede communication of the science at this level. <b>(5 – 6 marks)</b></p> <p><b>Level 2:</b> A comparison between risks and benefits is at least implied. Identifies a risk and a benefit. Gives an explanation of at least one. Quality of written communication partly impedes communication of the science at this level. <b>(3 – 4 marks)</b></p> <p><b>Level 1:</b> Identifies a risk and a benefit OR identifies either a risk or a benefit and gives some explanation. Quality of written communication impedes communication of the science at this level. <b>(1 – 2 marks)</b></p> <p><b>Level 0:</b> Insufficient or irrelevant science. Quality of written communication does not impede communication of the science at this level. <b>(5 – 6 marks)</b></p> <p><b>Level 2</b> Suggests that some people may be in favour and some against the project. Provides some negative and positive effects of the project that may be related to these people. Quality of written communication partly impedes communication of the science at this level. <b>(3 – 4 marks)</b></p> <p><b>Level 1</b> Identifies some positive or negative effects of the proposed project. They may imply that there are people either in favour or against. Quality of written communication impedes communication of the science at this level. <b>(1 – 2 marks)</b></p> <p><b>Level 0</b> Insufficient or irrelevant science.
