


In collision 2, all the momentum and KE is transferred to the last sphere because it gets to the same height as the first one.</li> <li>• the answer communicates ideas clearly and coherently uses a range of scientific terminology accurately</li> <li>• spelling, punctuation and grammar are used with few errors</li> </ul> |
