Choosing a Topic for the AQA A-Level Geography Fieldwork Investigation (NEA):

Line of Enquiry

Look through the **specification** and find an area of interest to you - the topic does not have to be from one of your chosen units

- 2. If you are going on **holiday**, consider the opportunities for conducting fieldwork there
- 3. Consider linking your **interests or passions** to the fieldwork
- 4. If you find a specific area in the specification harder than others, completing fieldwork in this area could improve your confidence
- 5. Examine **recent issues in your local area**, which may be suitable for an investigation
- 6. Contact local organisations and groups, who might already be investigating your local area. E.g. local councils or community groups

Example

- If you are interested in hazards, you could investigate the success of flood mitigation and preparedness in a particular area (Hazards)
- 2. If you are travelling to the coast, you could investigate the effectiveness of hard and soft engineering (Coasts)
- 3. If you enjoy attending gigs or sports matches, you could analyse the effect of an event on the surrounding area (Changing Places)
- 4. If you struggle understanding the interrelationships between the Carbon and Water cycles, you could study the impact of woodland management in a local forest (Water and Carbon Cycles)
- 5. If urban growth is occurring in your locality, could you investigate the causes of this and its effects on the urban area? (Contemporary Urban Environments)
- 6. Have there been problems with water supply in your area recently? Which physical factors is this a result of and what are the council doing? (Resource Security)

The advice and examples above are intended as **suggestions only** and it is paramount that each student **independently chooses a unique topic** for their investigation
