Source 1: From a report by the Head of the Chinese Red Cross written in 1947. The Red Cross was an international organisation founded to protect human life and health. This report presents the findings from his visits to the Guomindang reception centres to observe the conditions for Guomindang conscripts.

In one reception centre I met a group of draftees from Guangdong. 'How many draftees are there in your group?' I asked.

'There were 700 of us at the beginning of the journey. Now only 17 have remained.'

'Are you telling me that all but 17 have successfully escaped on the road?'

'No, sir', they replied. 'Where could they run away to on a road? The areas we passed through were nothing but wilderness. We had no food with us when we started the journey, and we had to survive on whatever we could find on the road. When we could not find anything, we, of course, starved.'

In many of the reception centres that I had visited, the draftees were tied to one another to prevent any possible escape. They had no freedom of movement whatsoever. Cruelties like this appeared time and again during my inspection tour. The lack of sympathy on the part of army recruiters was almost universal.

Source 2: From Harry Wu's account of his experiences at university during the Hundred Flowers Campaign. He was the son of a prosperous banker. From 1960 he was imprisoned in Chinese labour camps for 19 years and later emigrated to the USA. This account was published in 2009.

It was a disguised way of finding out who was for, and who was against, the Communist revolution. The Communist Party asked everyone at the university to speak out. In my class, seven were Party members and sixteen were Communist Youth League. The secretary of the Communist Party said to me: 'We want to ask you in a friendly and straightforward way: what are your views on politics?'

I said, 'The Soviet involvement in the Hungarian Revolution last year was right, because Hungary was involved in counter-revolution. But I think that one country's military intervention in another country's political affairs is a violation of international law.'

A couple of weeks later, they arranged for some students to come forward and talk about the two points I had raised.

'So you disagree with the Soviet invasion. It means you disagree with the policies of Communism. You are a counter-revolutionary rightist.'

The school put up a big poster: 'Harry Wu is a counter-revolutionary rightist'. From that point on, I was forced to make confessions, to tell on my classmates, and accept the lead of my Communist League classmates. The Communist Party appointed two people to watch over me. I had to report to them: tell them where I went, what I was doing, and what I was thinking. I lost freedom.

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
